This is obviously of great concern and local officers have been spending as much time as possible patrolling the area. If you see anyone driving dangerously on this or any other road we would appreciate a call.

This behaviour is clearly unacceptable. We will be stepping up our patrols in the area and those caught will be dealt with.

There have been a couple of changes to staffing here at the Nigg Community Policing Team, with Inspector Steven McEwan taking responsibility for the area. Inspector McEwan brings a wealth of experience from several policing areas and will ensure the good work already being carried by your local officers continues.

In recent weeks the Nigg Community Policing Team (CPT) has continued to work on initiatives designed to tackle local issues.

One such initiative was Operation Fedderate which ran over consecutive weekends at the end of August 2014 and aimed to proactively tackle instances of anti-social behavior, drug and alcohol misuse and to promote road safety. As a result 2 persons were charged with offences relating to the misuse of controlled drugs, one person was traced and apprehended on Warrant, 20 drivers were dealt with for various road traffic offences including disqualified driving and several drivers were warned in relation to vehicle defects, lighting offences and for excessive/inappropriate speed. Constables Jake Woo and Matthew Pirie from the Nigg CPT were accompanied on patrol by a photographer from a local newspaper and demonstrated how police engage with the community and target offenders. The Operation was a great success and will have given those caught breaking the law something to think about in the future.
